## 2025: A Challenging Year for Seniors

The past year brought a mix of progress and pressure, and for many seniors, the balance tilted toward growing financial strain. Rising housing costs continued to outpace income, deepening the challenge for older residents already struggling to secure stable, affordable homes.

Food insecurity also became more pronounced. Federal changes to the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) resulted in reduced benefits for many low-income households, including seniors who were already stretching modest monthly budgets. Local food pantries reported

consistently high demand as older adults increasingly turned to community resources — like SilverSource — to help fill the gaps.

At the same time, Stamford saw renewed conversations about the future of senior housing and care. Proposals affecting long-standing residences for older and low-income individuals sparked community concern and highlighted how fragile housing stability can be for those aging without financial safety nets.

Statewide initiatives — including efforts to strengthen home-care access and expand protections for older adults — offered some hope, signaling a broader commitment to supporting independence and dignity as people age.

Through all of this, we were inspired every day by the remarkable resilience of Stamford's seniors and the way our community continues to show how much it cares.

## Volunteer Spotlight

Nicholas Vallejo, 17, has been volunteering at SilverSource since October. Work experience at a human services agency is a course requirement for a Human Development class he's taking at UConn. "I chose SilverSource because the older population have a lot to give. They have a lot of life experience," he says. "My grandmother inspired me to do this. She's since passed."

Nicholas makes survey calls for SilverSource. "I check in on our clients and see how SilverSource has impacted their life. A big part of it is just listening. It's good to hear that we're having an impact, and hearing what our clients have to say. It's always very positive. They love their caseworkers. I've heard many good things about each of them."

## Senior Story: Finding Stability

Leah, 67, a retired Certified Nursing Assistant, had always been the one to care for others. But in 2023, after years of chronic health challenges, she couldn't even care for herself. She couldn't dress, bathe, or manage her home. Her son, whom she'd relied on for help with daily tasks, had recently moved out and their relationship had become strained. She suddenly found herself without the support she needed.

That's when she first connected with Rodolfo Cordova, one of SilverSource's bilingual social workers. He arranged weekly deliveries of groceries and personal

care items, set her up with a personal alert system to give her immediate access to emergency services, and helped her to secure a Personal Care Assistant through the Department of Social Services. Life became much more manageable for Leah.

But in 2024, Rodolfo received a troubling call. Leah's home care services had stopped unexpectedly, her health had declined, and after a rent increase, she was at considerable risk of homelessness.

Rodolfo immediately stepped in. He partnered with Connecticut's Adult Protective Services to restore consistent home care services. While SilverSource immediately provided emergency financial assistance to help her avoid eviction, Rodolfo recognized that Leah needed help managing her finances. He supported her through the process of having a conservator appointed — someone to oversee her budget, protect her from financial instability, and ensure that she remained housed. SilverSource also reconnected her phone so that she could participate in her conservatorship hearings.

Today, Leah is feeling stronger, safer, and more hopeful. She knows she's not alone — she has Rodolfo and SilverSource in her corner.

## Thank You Stamford High

In November, the Stamford High School community made sure that seniors didn't miss out on Thanksgiving dinner by collecting holiday favorites like stuffing, cranberry sauce, and gravy and bundling these up with grocery store gift cards that seniors could use to buy their turkeys.

The day before Thanksgiving, students helped us load up our vans with almost 60 bags of groceries and gift cards for our older neighbors.

We had a steady stream of seniors picking up their Thanksgiving dinner bags, and a steady stream of volunteers delivering Thanksgiving groceries to homebound seniors.

We're so grateful for community partners like Stamford High School and its Director of Athletics, Chris Passamano, who heads up the annual drive.

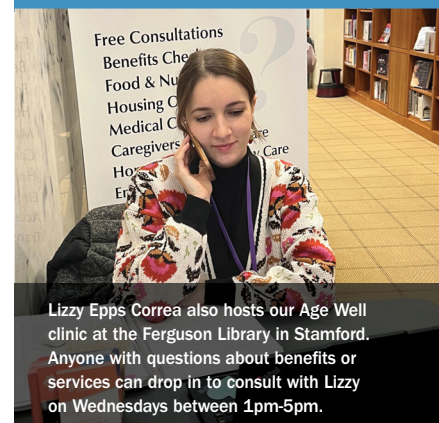

The Advisory Council provides SWCAA with insight into issues such as housing and access to care and social services.

## Circle of Caring
